As a Life Plan Community, we offer a continuum of support through four levels of living: Independent Living, Assisted Living, Memory Support, and Nursing Households. But no matter the level, all residents benefit from an environment optimized to enhance their self-agency and dignity. And all BRC residents enjoy the security of our **Home No Matter What Promise**, which ensures we will never ask them to leave because they have exhausted their financial resources.

BRC's culture transformation reached an important milestone in 2024. Ten years from the opening of our six nursing households, we've now spent a decade continuously refining what personcentered care looks like. Through initiatives like our Extended Family program, "BRC Beginnings" onboarding for new team members, and the promotion of our culture through Culture University, we've embraced individuality, honored personal preferences, and amplified resident voices, promoting a thriving, compassionate community.

This year, we launched the BRC Leadership Academy with Blue Ridge Community College, providing aspiring leaders with valuable skills to better lead their teams through the principles of servant leadership. Additionally, the BRC leadership team participated in an intensive retreat hosted by Culture U, further enriching leadership and driving innovation across our organization.

We also revamped team member orientation with BRC Beginnings, creating a more engaging experience for team members right from the start. Other Culture U programs, including dementia training, financial literacy workshops, and learning circles, provide team members with the support they need at home and the confidence to deliver exceptional care at work.

As part of our commitment to leadership development, Lauren Reeves, former Clinical Coordinator for Serenity House, was promoted to HR Manager of Organizational Design, Culture, and Training. She steps into this role as Annie Frazer transitions to the BRC Foundation, continuing to support our mission in new ways.

Vice President of HR Joel Shank reflected on our improved retention rate, rising from 49% in 2023 to 65% this year: "It's been a combination of factors—leaders engaging their teams, hiring team members who fit our culture, and communitywide improvements. Together, these efforts have created an environment where team members want to stay and succeed. It's exciting to see these results."

#### **Founders Day**

BRC celebrated its 59th anniversary with a special Founders Day initiative—BRC Gives Back. This day of service brought together residents, team members, and board members to make a meaningful impact both on and off campus. Volunteers tackled a variety of projects, from beautifying BRC's grounds to supporting local organizations like Generations Crossing and Valley Program for Aging Services.

One of the day's major highlights was a ramp-building project in collaboration with Habitat for Humanity's Critical Home Repair Program. Volunteers constructed two complete ramps to help local seniors age in place, reinforcing BRC's commitment to community support. Another notable opportunity invited Independent Living residents to shadow Certified Nursing Assistants (CNAs) for a day, offering them a firsthand look at the compassionate care provided across all six of BRC's nursing households.

The day wrapped up with a lively picnic at the Oasis, bringing together 210 residents, team members, and board members to celebrate their collective efforts. In total, BRC Gives Back contributed 30 projects, 91 volunteers, and approximately 200 hours of service to the community—a true testament to the spirit of giving at BRC.

#### **Community Connections**


BRC's **Community Connections** team brings residents and team members together to create meaningful, life-enriching opportunities through service, education, and outreach. Since its launch, it has grown into a cornerstone of BRC's commitment to giving back.

In 2024, Community Connections strengthened partnerships, supported resident-led projects, and tackled local challenges through donation drives, service projects, and educational initiatives. Below is a look at this year's impact and how volunteers continue to make a difference together:

- Six team members served meals at **Open Doors** for 40+ individuals experiencing homelessness. Residents made cookies and brownies for the meal.
- Children's Clothing Closet Donation Drive.
- Increased outreach for the Blue Ridge Area
   Food Bank with 10 team members and residents completing monthly service projects.

- Hosted Sodexo's peanut butter and jelly donation drive.
- Habitat for Humanity Information Session on group and individual volunteer opportunities.
- 10 participants washed 21 bags of laundry for 18 individuals experiencing homelessness through Open Door's Loads of Love.
- Unity Household residents made 20 care kits for Valley Program for Aging Services caregivers.
- Expanded Meals on Wheels service to two days a week, now delivering every Wednesday and Thursday.
- Six team members and residents participated in this year's **Blacks Run River Cleanup**.
- Made Easter baskets for 17 adults at
   Generation's Crossing.

- Donated food items for **Stock the Pantry Drive** supporting local fire, rescue, and police departments.

- Donated over 50 cakes for Fire & Rescue's Cake Drive.
- Seven team members and residents sorted donations for **United Way** Tools for Schools.
- Blue Ridge Christian School Volunteer Opportunities Information Session.

- Hosted a Mental Health First Aid session for residents and team members, presented by the Harrisonburg-Rockingham Community Services Board.
- Raised \$7,500 for the Alzheimer's Association during the annual ALZ Walk on campus, which saw 82 participants.

- Filled and distributed 20 **Blessing Thanksgiving Boxes** for families in need.
- Residents purchased gifts for 25 seniors in the area, supporting **Be a Santa to a Senior**.

- Set up a treat table for **Bridgewater College** students during exam week.
- Assembled gift bags for the Harrisonburg/ Rockingham Social Services Christmas event.
- Residents created vases for **Friendly City Florals** during a Christmas Elf Party.

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
#### Expanding Our Impact Through Innovation

Thanks to the Innovation Grant Process, three new communityfocused initiatives were launched:

- Wilbur Pence Middle School Partnership: BRC is partnering with the school's *Ruriteen Chapter* to provide books for kindergarteners and sensory learning tools for students in need. Residents will also assist in stuffing backpacks with school supplies.
- 2 Valley Program for Aging Services (VPAS) Vehicle Purchase: As a long-time partner supporting initiatives like *Meals on Wheels* and *VPAS Café*, BRC is matching raised funds to help VPAS purchase a new vehicle, ensuring continued transportation support for local older adults.
- **3** Food Security Backpack Program: In collaboration with John Wayland and Peak View Elementary Schools, BRC's Community Connections team will address gaps in local food security programs. Assisted Living and Nursing residents will volunteer to assemble backpacks for students in need.

Through these efforts, BRC continues to build meaningful relationships, create a lasting impact, and uphold our commitment to serving the broader community.


**leadership** and **50% of the nursing team** in Phase 1: Brain Changes Associated with Dementia, empowering team members with essential knowledge and skills. Their impact extends beyond the team, as they have also shared this training with **five residents** and **17 family members**, promoting a more informed and supportive community.



BRC is proud to have two licensed preceptors, President Rodney Alderfer and Vice President of Health Services Jeff Lambert. guiding future Nursing Home Administrators—a rare opportunity in the field. For roughly **10 years**, their mentorship has helped more than 10 BRC team members and JMU interns earn their Health Services Administrator (HSA) license, preparing them for leadership roles both at BRC and across the senior living industry. Through hands-on experience, these future administrators not only develop essential skills but also immerse themselves in BRC's unique culture of person-first care.

#### **Connected & Engaged**

Engagement is thriving at BRC, with **376 residents** using the Wellzesta app and an impressive 55% logging in daily. As a vital tool for staying connected, Wellzesta keeps residents engaged with 95% of regular users actively exploring its features. This year alone, **2,600 events** were listed across all dimensions of well-being—physical, social, financial, intellectual, vocational, spiritual, emotional, and environmental—earning outstanding ratings: an average of 4.71 for event quality and 4.69 for their impact on well-being.



IMPACT A Vacation Like No Other

BRC made history this fall by organizing its first-ever overnight trip to Smith Mountain Lake, offering a unique and meaningful experience for residents in higher levels of care. This groundbreaking adventure, made possible by the generosity of donors and the innovation grant program, allowed residents to reconnect with the world beyond BRC.

The trip, coordinated by Assisted Living Life Enrichment Specialist Karyn Posey, was a dream come true for residents who had long felt that travel was no longer an option. The team meticulously planned every detail, ensuring that medical needs were met and accessibility was prioritized. Highlights of the trip included cruising the lake on a pontoon boat, enjoying campfires and s'mores, and creating lasting memories with fellow residents and team members.

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The impact of the trip was profound. Families expressed heartfelt gratitude, and residents who had initially hesitated to join are now eagerly anticipating future adventures. This trip not only brought joy and relaxation to residents but also showcased the power of donor support in creating transformative experiences.

As the team reflects on the success of the Smith Mountain Lake trip, plans are already underway for the next adventure, ensuring that BRC residents continue to experience the joys of travel and connection.

















## BRC's Household Nurse Call system was buzzing in 2024—literally!

With 815 devices in action, the SARA automated alerting platform logged an incredible **366,095 alerts**—about **1,003 per day**—streamlining communication and response to call bells, pendants, and even refrigerator temperature monitoring to keep households running smoothly.

IMPACT Thriving Afreen Spaces

#### Garden Club in the Wellness Garden

Since 2023, BRC's Wellness Garden has offered a peaceful outdoor retreat for residents and therapy clients, designed to support healing and mobility practice through mixed-terrain pathways, sensory elements, and relaxation areas. This year, an innovation grant further enhanced the garden's role by funding therapeutic horticultural programming, bringing expanded gardening opportunities to Assisted Living's Garden Club and Nursing residents.

More than just a space for planting, the Garden Club is a true therapeutic horticulture program, led by certified Therapeutic Horticulture Practitioner and Vice President of Development and Community Relations, Carrie Budd. Therapeutic horticulture is an evidence-based practice that enhances residents' well-being by cultivating engagement, cognitive stimulation, and a sense of purpose. With the addition of raised beds, specialized equipment, and other







resources to improve accessibility, the Wellness Garden has become an integral part of BRC's commitment to holistic well-being.

#### A New Community Garden

BRC's vision for expanded green spaces is becoming a reality as phase one of the Community Garden takes shape. Thanks to the collaboration of the maintenance and grounds teams, along with dedicated resident volunteers, the newly expanded and relocated garden is already thriving.



Raised garden beds have been built and installed, providing accessible spaces for residents to grow their favorite plants. A greenhouse and resident garden shed are now in place, along with a new fence and hedge border to enhance the space. Fruit bushes have also been planted, and plans for the cut flower garden are underway.

Looking ahead, BRC is excited to begin the next phase of the project—introducing a dining production garden that will supply fresh, homegrown produce to BRC's dining venues and kitchens. As opportunities for well-being, engagement, and sustainability continue to expand, this garden is becoming an integral part of BRC's commitment to enriching the resident experience.

#### Beauty & Wellness on the Crist Farm Trails

The Crist Farm Walking Trails thrived this year! A brood of bluebirds hatched in the trail's nesting boxes, bringing new life to the landscape. Residents embraced the outdoors with yoga, tai chi, and sound baths, while continued work on the wildflower meadow ensures our scenic paths stay vibrant and blooming.

IMPACT Enhancing Connections Across Campus

Over the past year, BRC's well-being team has expanded opportunities for residents to connect, engage, and thrive across all levels of living. With a strengthened leadership structure and the support of the Extended Family program, more residents than ever are participating in activities that bring joy and purpose to their days. Here's how it's going:

#### **Extended Families**

The revival of the Extended Family program has been a game-changer. By pairing non-direct care team members with households, the program provides extra support during outings and activities while developing meaningful relationships. As a result, a new dynamic is emerging: residents across different levels of





care are engaging with one another in ways never seen before. Independent Living residents now join music programs in Assisted Living and Lantz Chapel, while Assisted Living and Nursing residents participate in the Speaker Series and karaoke events. These shared experiences are strengthening community bonds and creating moments of joy across campus.

#### New Ways to Stay Active

The fitness team put in hard work to launch Spiro100 virtual fitness classes this year, bringing even more fitness opportunities to the community. From Standing Strong to Yin Yoga, Cardio Dance to Standing Drumming, and Glo Drumming, the team continues finding creative ways to keep residents active and engaged. The results speak for themselves: Sprio100 classes have been extremely well-received, offering something for every fitness level and preference. One resident submitted a 'Fill the Cup' recognition for the team, sharing: "A special thanks to Donovan and his team for our glow drumming experience! It was so much fun. They dedicate so much of their time to making sure we have a blast while getting our exercise in!"





#### **Prom Party**

Building on the success of this year's sock hop, the Senior Prom remains a much-anticipated new tradition at BRC. Thanks to the innovation grant process, this beloved event will continue bringing

residents, team members, and families together for a night of fun and celebration. Residents eagerly await to see what next year's theme has in store!



#### **Opening Minds Through Art**

BRC is proud to continue offering the innovative Opening Minds through Art (OMA) program, a meaningful initiative which provides residents living with dementia the opportunity to express themselves through art. This year, a new facilitator was trained and the OMA team invested in additional supplies to keep the creative energy flowing. Since 2023, OMA has thrived thanks to an innovation grant and funds raised through the LiveWell campaign. Moving forward, it will become a self-sustaining program through its annual art show.

OMA's first art show in March raised an impressive \$2,500, paving the way for its future success. BRC residents are also gaining statewide recognition for their work. Four resident artists were featured in the first-ever statewide virtual OMA art show this fall! It is exciting to watch this program continue to flourish, enriching the lives of residents and volunteers through creativity and connection.



Since its founding in 1983, the BRC Foundation has raised funds to support BRC's mission to care for residents who have exhausted their financial resources. As an autonomous organization governed by a separate board of directors, the **BRC** Foundation also supports on-campus programming, raises capital funds for major infrastructure projects, and provides support for team members with scholarship opportunities and emergency relief.




